From the Pastor

Happy July!!!!! I think.....I'm opening the door for July with caution. Independence Day! Strangely Jesus teaches his disciples to be dependent on God. He says to call God Father, and if we need protection or help—just call out. We, in the United States will be

blowing up gunpowder in the sky, waving our flags and celebrating our independence. What are we supposed to do? Steve Thomson gives a good example:

Dependence. Put your hands like this: one reaching down and grabbing the other, like it's lifting it up. An infant will die if left alone. A child is completely dependent upon a more mature human for survival. The child is not able—physically, intellectually, emotionally, or spiritually—to survive and thrive.

Independence. Put your hands like this: two fists facing each other. The adolescent must go through a process of weaning from the dependence phase. She must learn that she is now physically, intellectually, emotionally, and spiritually able to encounter life as an individual and make choices without the supervision of those upon whom she depended as a child. This is good and right, and often very painful for the family system.

Interdependence. Put your hands like this: two hands, side by side, fingers interlaced. While

the process of learning independence is good and healthy, it is not reality. The truth of the universe is that nothing exists completely alone and nothing has everything within itself to survive. All things are interdependent upon other things for survival. The mature human recognizes the truth of <u>Genesis 3:18</u> when God said that it was not good for the man to be alone. We were created for community and we must learn to rely upon each other, offering our strengths and allowing other's strengths to complement our weaknesses.

A Leadership Update

Search Committee Update

Over the last month the Search Committee has had 3 meetings and since the creation of our committee in Feb. we've had a total of 15 meetings.

Since our last report to you an additional 7 surveys were returned to us for a total of 61 completed surveys (38% return rate). We received great feedback from the surveys and again thank everyone for their input. I can assure you that we have poured over every single comment and have had many hours of discussions on your remarks. While we have reviewed many documents, studies and financial reports none are more important than the surveys you have completed. We wish to assure you that we will do our best to use your comments to better our church family and to find the type of Pastor that you are looking for.

We have also begun work on the writing of our Church Profile (the document which will give prospective Pastoral candidates a broad overview of our church). The work on the Profile will take quite some time as it is quite a lengthy document. We hope to have it completed by Oct. 1. Subsequent to the completion of the Profile the committee will prepare itself for the interviewing of potential candidates. Please keep in mind that the mission of the Search Committee is the successful search for a "permanent" Pastor. Church Board has the responsibility and is indeed presently seeking an Interim Pastor. Pastor Lynn Shoemaker presently is our Supply Pastor conducting Sunday services until an Interim Pastor is hired.

While the committee wishes to move as quickly as possible to find a permanent Pastor please keep in mind that according to our Conference the average search time for a permanent Pastor is 12-18 months. Given that these numbers are averages, it may take longer. As this process unfolds we'll try and give you some idea of whether or not we are finding ourselves within the above stated 12-18 month parameter.

So we continue to ask you for your patience through this lengthy process. Most importantly, we continue to ask you for your prayers of wisdom and discernment as we seek that person whom God is calling to serve us.

A Leadership Update

Conference News

Like so many individuals and organizations have had to do in recent months (LUCC included), PNEC had to recognize that income would suddenly drop off precipitously as a result of the sudden, forced withdrawal from the economy when we all sheltered at home. The common response to that reality was to review obligations, expenditures and, at the very least, consider reordering priorities. In keeping with our fiduciary responsibilities, we at the Conference also aligned columns of needs and wants.

Fortunately, the trickle of OCWM support did not cease completely; and even more fortunately, the PNEC also had some invested reserves to draw upon and they were eligible for some of the stimulus programs (Ex. Payroll Protection Program) made available through the government. Therefore, the PNEC Board authorized those actions at their latest meeting.

Other actions included a final vote on the latest edits to the Gift Acceptance Policy, and a discussion about the next step in formulating guidance for those making decisions about accepting certain gifts.

Also, a vote was taken on whether PNEC wished to support a Supreme Court Amicus Brief which supported "LGBT persons, their relationships and their families". The vote was unanimous to add the Conference's support to this case.

One other bit of news to pass on - the Conference received a letter from the Board of the National Church informing us that they have made the decision to cancel the in-person session of the 33rd General Synod meeting, scheduled to be held in the summer of 2021, due to continued concerns about the threat of the COVID-19 pandemic extending well into next year, and grave concerns about those who would have to travel a great distance and expose themselves to a risk to their health. The Nat'l Board opted instead for a virtual gathering and will spend the next 15 months planning how to make that a "holy, engaging and inspiring gathering of our church – complete with worship, theological reflection, opportunities for connection and the regular business of the church".


Thank you Notes & Personal thank you's...

Notes from the Treasurer

Included in Other income are the lease payments for 2 months from Sprint in the amount of \$3,450, the Learning Center facility use payment of \$2,045 and the workers' compensation premium reimbursement by the Learning Center of \$3,200.45 for 2 months, \$1,200 for use of the Schubert Haus by the Longswamp Township Historical Society, and \$16,700 in loan proceeds from the Paycheck Protection Program. Included in Building Fund expenses are \$172 for water testing and equipment monitoring, \$384.87 for electric service, \$553.38 for propane gas to heat the sanctuary and boy scout cabins and \$625 for mowing and trimming.
